WHO CAN BE A SCOUT?

All young people, both male and female aged six to 25 of every background.

There are five age ranges in Scouting.

- **Beaver Scouts** 6-8
- **Cub Scouts** 8-10½
- **Scouts** 10½-14
- **Explorer Scouts** 14-18
- **Scout Network** 18-25

If you choose to volunteer, you can work directly with young people or in a support role as a team or individual.

Prior experience or a connection with Scouting is not necessary and we welcome people from different backgrounds.

Remember, you can decide how much or little time you give to Scouting.
